### Scope and Content -1911-2023

Consists, for the most part, of a galley proof, typescripts, and edited typescripts of the author's published works, including short stories, articles and books. Also included are two typescripts of screenplays by Christopher Peditto, a friend of the author. Also included is a box of manuscript, typescripts and several published books of Peter Rabe. Three boxes of the "Mystery Scene" magazine. Some correspondence.

**Biographical Note:** Ed Gorman was born and grew up in Cedar Rapids where he spent much of his adult life. He attended Coe College on a playwriting scholarship and graduated in 1968 and valued the creative writing education he received at Coe. After graduation he worked for over 20 years in advertising, public relations and

speech writing. He became a full-time writer after the publication of his first novel, *Rough Cut*, in 1984. Ellery Queen called Ed “one of suspense fiction’s best storytellers,” and the San Diego Union described him as “one of the most original voices in today’s crime fiction.” This novel was followed by 140 other books, mostly mystery, suspense and western novels. Besides novels he was a prolific writer of over 100 short stories and articles. He also did reviews of other mystery novels for The Cedar Rapids Gazette. Being an author lead him and Robert J. Randisi to establish a magazine devoted to publishing other author’s stories, “Mystery Scene” was started in 1985.

He won many awards including; Anthony Awards, Locus Awards, Edgar Awards, Spur Award, Agatha Award, Bram Stoker Award, International Horror Guild Award, Macavity Awards, Shamus Award. Adaptation of his work include his novel *The Poker Club* was adapted as a film in 2008 by director Tim McCann. His short stories “The Long Silence After” and “The Ugly File” were adapted as short films. In 2016, rights to his novel *Cage of Night* and short story “Stalker” were bought for adaptation as graphic novels, to be published by Short, Scary Tales. His short stories appeared in magazines as diverse as Redbook, Ellery Queen, The Magazine of Fantasy and Science Fiction and Poetry Today. A few of the accolades his work received include: “No writer of popular fiction is more consistently readable and challenging than Ed Gorman”-Ellery Queen. “Gorman has a wonderful writing style that allows him to say things of substance in an entertaining way” – The San Francisco Examiner. “What keeps you reading is not the traditional question of whodunit but the slick and artful ease with which Gorman portrays the alienated, uncaring world of his creations in this darkly mesmerizing novel.” – The London Sunday Times.

In his personal life Ed was a lover of reading. He read everybody: Mickey Spillane, Isaac Asimov, F. Scott Fitzgerald, William Shakespeare. And a family man. He married Cathleen Stevens in 1964. They were later divorced. In 1982, he married Carol Maxwell Johnson an award-winning children's and young adult author. He had two children and six grandchildren. Ed died in October of 2016 from cancer. Upon his death a Gorman Reading Series “Celebration of Popular Fiction” was established by Carol at Coe College.
