## Coe video trilogy near completion

The restoration of the Coe video trilogy depicting campus life in three distinct eras (the late 1930s before entry of the United States into World War II and the end of the Depression; the post-Sputnik era in the early 1960s; and the flourishing of the counter culture in the early 1970s) will soon be complete. The first two of these historically significant films of the Coe campus were restored through grants from the National Film Preservation Foundation. The third film, a faculty and student-produced home movie filmed and produced on Coe's campus in 1972 by Professor John Chapman, **Stephen Cone '72**, and the late Jack Laugen, was sent for restoration this spring, funded by generous gifts from members of the classes of 1972-76.

"I have made probably two hundred commercials and fifteen to twenty 15-30 minute films since my days at Coe, but none was done on such a small budget, over a year in production, and with as great a cast — particularly the Coe coeds!" said Cone.

During the 1972-76 cluster reunion at Coe last October, members of these reunion

classes gathered in the library's AV Theater for a special viewing of the film. Not yet restored at that time, the film was fragile; however, given the significance of the film to these returning alumni, the library staff and Alumni Office wanted to offer a one-time showing of the 20-minute film. Driven by a strong sense of nostalgia, members of these reunion classes stepped forward to fund the restoration of the film and its 80-plus minutes of outtakes.

The premiere showing of the restored 1965 film was held in Kesler Lecture Hall on March 16. Filmed under the McCabe presidency for the purpose of securing matching funds for a Ford Foundation grant, the film focuses on academic excellence and documents the response of a small college to the first of the baby boomers to enter college in large numbers. White gloves and bouffant hairdos on coeds, male students in neckties and beanies on freshmen, this film represents the end of an era and depicts a college campus unaware of the social upheavals just around the corner.

The tightly scripted movie features appearances by many well-known faculty and alumni, including **William P. Whipple '35**, the late **Robert Armstrong '18**, Professor Emerita of

Sociology Mary Alice Ericson, Marvin D. Cone Professor Emeritus of Art Robert Kocher and Professor Emeritus of German Herb Wiese. The film closes with a cameo from revered Professor Emeritus of Chemistry Ben Peterson.

The circa 1939 film is a 30-minute, silent color film composed of scenes of Coe College, campus activities, students and faculty. This film brings color to Coe's history, which is often viewed through black and white photographs. It also features Coe's historic leaders, after whom many buildings are named: President Harry Gage, Professor Ben Peterson, and football coach Morey Eby.

## Kocher's hangin' and soup's on


Two new pieces of art have recently been donated to the college. A life-sized portrait of Robert Kocher, Marvin D. Cone Professor Emeritus of Art, is now hanging on the first floor of the library near the reference counter. The painting is the work of Cedar Rapids painter David Garman. Kocher met Garman at the Cedar Rapids Museum of Art a few years ago when they found themselves admiring the same painting. After introducing themselves, Garman responded with an astounded, "You're Bob Kocher?" and recounted that when he was in high school, he received a letter from Kocher praising his paintings that were then on display at a high school student art exhibit. Garman noted that he kept the letter and it inspired him to keep painting. As a thank you for encouraging a young artist, Garman asked if he could paint Kocher's portrait.

## Help Coe meet the Library Challenge Program

Thanks to the generosity of the Kinney-Lindstrom Foundation, Mansfield Trust and the Maytag Family Foundation, the Library Challenge Program, administered by the Iowa College Foundation (ICF), is in full swing once again. These donors have contributed \$170,000 to fund the challenge program this year. These funds are available to all 25 ICF member colleges, including Coe.

To receive a portion of the funds, each member school must secure gifts to the library equal to three times the amount of their fund allotment. ## Periodicals in Perpetuity

The PIP Endowment supports annual subscription costs of periodical titles. Begun in April 2001, the endowment principle totals \$889,965.33 in gifts and pledges. The lead gift came from Joanne M. Pochobradsky '48. The Pochobradsky Reading Room, containing the current issues of the paper periodicals and newspapers, was named in her honor and dedicated in May 2003.

Each \$1,000 gift supports the annual subscription costs to one title. Bound volumes of endowed titles contain a bookplate with the donor-specified inscription following the phrase "Periodicals in Perpetuity Endowment." In addition, the bibliographic records of all endowed titles contain a similar note.


