There was an undeniable sense of pride and optimism on the faces of attendees and within the words spoken by those addressing the crowd — as more than 120 people gathered September 30 to celebrate the ceremonial start of the construction phase of the David and Janice McInally Center for Health and Society (CHS). Members of the Coe, Cedar Rapids and local medical communities gathered behind Cherry Auditorium and reviewed the architectural renderings of the future facility, heard about the impact the CHS will have on the region and signed their names on a steel beam that will be used in construction of the building.

The CHS facility will be a space dedicated to advising, mentoring and preparing students for careers in the growing health care industry. It is named for Coe President Emeritus David McInally and former First Lady Janice

McInally. Dave served as Coe's 15th president from July 2013 until the end of 2020. He recently was succeeded by **David T. Hayes '93** as the 16th president. Both were instrumental in implementing the college's current strategic plan, A Bolder Coe, of which the CHS is a critical component.

Hayes, Coe Trustee Dr. Tim Sagers '97 and Coe Board of Trustees Chair Ken Golder '82 addressed event attendees, and all shared a similar message: The CHS will have a transformative impact on health care locally and on a broader scale.

"The CHS will be a rare place — a place where all students from any major or area of study can be exposed to the complex health care ecosystem by didactic work, clinical exploration, internships and research," said Sagers, who







is the medical director of MercyCare Business Health Solutions and a doctor with MercyCare Community Physicians. "Coe's proximity to the MedQuarter will allow us to strengthen our relationships and build new opportunities with our partners in the MedQuarter at Mercy, UnityPoint and Physicians' Clinic of Iowa. Our work at the CHS will garner much attention and will allow Coe to build new opportunities near and far."

Sagers also noted construction of the CHS comes at an opportune time, especially in light of the COVID-19 pandemic.

"I am optimistic that we are about to witness an explosion of health care-related innovation and a significant retooling of the health care system, and our students, faculty and staff here at the CHS will lead the way," he said.

Local health care and business organizations attending in support of the project included The Hall-Perrine Foundation, Mercy Medical Center, UnityPoint Health - St. Luke's Hospital, Cedar Rapids Metro Economic Alliance, MedQuarter Regional Medical District, Family Caregivers Center of Mercy, Rock Valley Physical Therapy, East Central Iowa Acute Care Emergency Medicine and Dental Equipment and Supply.

"Seeing the Coe community and MedQuarter leaders come together for the steel signing offered an exciting preview of the enhanced partnerships the CHS will foster," said Hayes. "Initiatives of this magnitude cannot happen without incredible collaboration and trusted partnerships, and we are grateful to have these in abundance at Coe. This event was a fitting way to kick off the construction phase of this transformative project."

Funding for the CHS has come in the form of several generous lead gifts from alumni and friends of the college, as well as a \$700,000 challenge grant from the Hall-Perrine Foundation of Cedar Rapids. The CHS will open in the fall of 2022.

An excerpt from Dr. Sagers' remarks

The CHS is about our need for new kinds of health care professionals, nurses and other providers who have a solid understanding of data and how it can impact clinical decision making. Using data analytic tools to make real-time clinical decisions will fundamentally change care delivery and make health care safer. The incorporation of Coe's new data analytics coursework into the study of the life sciences could allow Coe to produce a new generation of caregivers with skills graduates from other institutions do not possess but are greatly needed.

It's about providing a health care context to our social science students and those studying politics and policy, so they can leave Coe and help solve the problems of health care inequity made so obvious during the pandemic. These disparities have tremendous impact on health outcomes. It will take a multidisciplinary approach to better understand and find solutions for these complex social determinants of health.

It's about providing an understanding of the significant role mental health plays in societal health as a whole — so our psychology students and others might be motivated to pursue a clinical career to help solve the tremendous deficiencies in our mental health system delivery, a system that struggles to provide even simple access to the one in five Americans who deal with a mental health problem.

It's about computer science and engineering directed students who can leave Coe with a core understanding of the health delivery model, leveraging the IT and Al technologies so they can build new platforms and products to open new health care access, enhance communication between provider and patient and help patients find greater control and influence over their health care.

It's about music and performing arts students who understand the healing power of music and the arts on seriously ill patients and those at the end of their life. It is about those studying creative arts who can illustrate and demonstrate complex health concepts to patients and their families.

It's about business, econ and accounting majors who will leave Coe with an understanding of the financial and supply chain inefficiencies behind our health care delivery system so they can find new ways to maintain financial solvency, build more reliable supply logistics systems and find new ways to fund care for those most in need.


These are just a few examples of the kind of cross-campus opportunities the CHS could produce. Opportunities made possible by Coe's commitment to the liberal arts and the real life, career-oriented work supported by our center for creativity and careers initiative.

I have only scratched the surface here. I believe the applications and use cases that will be borne of the CHS are endless.

I am confident that we can see immediate results.

The close working relationship shared by our faculty and students will allow for new ideas to grow quickly.

16TH PRESIDENT



Nearly 30 years after serving as Coe's student body president, **David T. Hayes**'93 officially assumed the presidency of Coe College October 1, 2021

cting as interim president since January 1, 2021,
Hayes sustained the positive progress of the A Bolder
Coe strategic plan and guided the college through
a public health crisis and recovery from a natural
disaster, the August 2020 derecho. In the interim time period,
Coe enrolled the third-largest class in the college's history, earned
national rankings for its internship and networking initiatives
and successfully advanced fundraising for the David and Janice
McInally Center for Health and Society. In his prior role as vice
president for advancement he increased Coe's average annual
fundraising outcomes by nearly 40% over the previous five-year
average.

After graduating magna cum laude from Coe in 1993, Hayes continued his education at the University of Iowa College of Law where he earned his Juris Doctor with high distinction and an LLM in international and comparative law. He practiced law with Shuttleworth & Ingersoll PLC in Cedar Rapids prior to returning to Coe in 2001 as a member of the faculty.

A passionate teacher, Hayes is known for his commitment to the student experience as an engaging and accessible mentor, twice earning the Charles J. Lynch Outstanding Teacher Award and holding the Louis J. & Ella Pochobradsky chair. He also directed Coe's pre-law and environmental studies programs before transitioning to vice president for advancement in 2014.

months has been humbling to witness," Hayes said. "It is with great joy and eagerness that I begin this new role as president, especially at a college so dear to me personally."

In addition to his fundraising acumen and teaching accolades, Hayes has been a leading force in recent transformative efforts across campus. Under his leadership, the development of the C3: Creativity, Careers, Community center was started and completed. He has guided sustainability initiatives like the solar panels on Clark Racquet Center, the green roof on Gage Memorial Union and a water management program.

Hayes and his wife, Heather, are the parents of three children, Mackenzie, Johanna and Allison. Heather is the senior pastor at First Presbyterian Church in Cedar Rapids.



COE COLLEGE NAVIGATES EXTRAORDINARY RECRUITING YEAR TO WELCOME THIRD-LARGEST CLASS

High school students across the country continue to take notice of Coe College's perennial national recognition as a leading college, as Coe welcomed 436 new students this fall.

Coe is in the top 7% of four-year colleges and universities on The Princeton Review Best Value Colleges list, and ranks nationally in the private college category as the 10th Best School for Internships and the 20th Best Alumni Network. Coe is the only lowa college or university to earn rankings in both categories.

The incoming students comprise the third-largest class in the college's 170-year history, including the largest domestic firstyear population ever. The nine largest classes in Coe's history have all come over the past nine years.

Over the past year, communicating the opportunities and value that a Coe education creates took ingenuity and patience when relationship-building and campus visits were mostly limited to a virtual setting.

"I'm thrilled to be able to welcome these students," said Associate Vice President for Enrollment Josh Kite. "This past year was atypical in so many ways, but the one thing that never wavered was the resiliency of the admission staff and Coe community working together alongside our incoming class to navigate this unforeseen situation."

Coe remained committed to connect on a personal level with students who were interested in enrolling at Coe. In addition to limited in-person contact, online chats, video calls and virtual tours with a student guide allowed admission counselors to demonstrate and discuss the Coe experience.

The efforts resulted in the impressive class, which is composed of students from 27 different states and six countries - the second-largest state distribution in the college's history. Of the 436 students, 48% will play varsity athletics, 42% are first-generation students and one-third

(33.5%) come from underrepresented backgrounds, also the second highest percentage in the college's history. The class academic profile features an average GPA of 3.7 and average ACT of 25.

"It's a historic class in historic times. It speaks to our reputation and to our commitment to foster academic excellence and student success," Kite said.

The Class of 2025 is currently working with members of the newly formed Office of Student Success and Persistence to aid in their transition to college. Success coaches will work with members of the class throughout the year to provide guidance on how to assimilate into a college environment.

"Coe is poised to meet the needs of this generation of students. We recognize the uniqueness of the times and have risen to provide the needed services to our community," said Vice President for Enrollment, Marketing and Institutional Effectiveness Julie Kleis Staker '93. "In addition to the Office of Student Success and Persistence, our C3: Creativity, Careers, Community center is connecting students to alumni and internships in a way that's nationally recognized, and Coe continues to proceed with innovations like our Center for Health and Society."

"We're excited to not only welcome these students to their new home but to begin to pair them with these opportunities while they are undergraduate students, which in turn will create valuable professional experience and networks to open doors upon graduation," Staker said.

The efforts to enhance academics with career-affirming experiences and professional connections have been effective. For the past decade, reporting Coe graduates have been employed, in graduate school or involved in service opportunities nearly 100% of the time within nine months of graduation. The national average is 83%.

2021 HOMECOMING Home Sweet Coe! **OCTOBER 21-24**

Campus was bustling with activity throughout Homecoming week, as Kohawk pride blazed as bright as the crimson and gold leaves decorating campus. Between unwinding with pet therapy and jamming at Kohawk Rock, students energetically commemorated Homecoming week. Meanwhile, the classes of 1970 and 1971 celebrated their golden anniversary with a pinning and party recognizing 50 years as Kohawks! The Athletic Hall of Fame added two new classes to the ranks, and three remarkable alumni were honored with awards. To top it all off, the Kohawk football team was victorious with a 63-7 win over Luther College. As over 600 alumni returned to campus, it was affirmed that campus always will be home sweet Coe.

HONORING DISTINGUISHED KOHAWKS

The Coe College Alumni Council celebrated Coe's finest at the All-Alumni Recognition Program during Homecoming. Justin Nylin '13 was the recipient of the Young Alum Award, Paula Ginder Lentz '89 was the recipient of the Alumni Award of Merit and Heather Daniels '95 was presented with the Distinguished Service Award.

YOUNG ALUM AWARD

At MercyOne Clinton Medical Center in Clinton, Iowa, everyone knows Justin Nylin. His mom, Carol, has worked there for over four decades but says, "I get called 'Justin's mom' all the time here at Mercy. He has a huge outreach in the community and the hospital. Everybody knows Justin around here."

Nylin has worked at MercyOne Clinton for 13 years and has served as a registered nurse since he graduated from Coe with his nursing degree in 2013. He first worked as a nurse in the Intensive Care Unit and then became a house supervisor in Clinical Operations. In his next role, he ran daily operations for the Ambulatory Care Unit as the unit charge nurse, where he expanded the unit's treatment options to include Peripherally Inserted Central Catheter (PICC) insertion for daily antibiotics or chemotherapy, as well as pain management for patients with severe and chronic pain. Next, he took a role as a nursing supervisor where Nylin monitored quality of care and patient satisfaction and developed and facilitated educational training for fellow nurses in his units. In his current role as director of cardiac services at MercyOne Clinton, Nylin is responsible for daily operations of the cardiac catheterization lab, stress lab and cardiac rehabilitation. At the same time, he also serves as a registered nurse at Bickford Assisted Living where he coordinates care with patients and their families.

In addition to his Coe nursing degree, Nylin earned his Master of Science in nursing from Chamberlain University in 2018. He specialized in the nurse executive track while attending Chamberlain, where he graduated with high distinction. Even as a successful leader in his hometown hospital, Nylin is able to retain his critical care certification through the American Association of Critical Care Nurses.

Nylin has served on several councils and committees at MercyOne Clinton during his tenure, including the Executive Interprofessional Practice Council. He has educated and guided new nurses as a preceptor since 2014 and provides training and guidance to students as the high school medical careers coordinator. In his community, Nylin serves on the Career and Technical Education Advisory Board at Clinton High School and gives presentations about nursing and the medical field at various community sites and events.

Given Nylin's passion for serving others, it's no surprise he chooses to give back to Coe. As a student, Nylin was involved in the Student Nursing Association, Student Alumni Association, Lambda Chi Alpha fraternity, Student Senate as the student body president, Flunk Day Committee and Senior Class Gift Committee, and he also served as a College Adjustment Peer. As an alumnus, he serves on the Coe College Nursing Advisory Board and is a regular guest lecturer in Coe nursing classes. He is still actively involved in his fraternity and was a mentor in the Coe College Alumni Mentoring Program in 2018 and 2019. He has attended every Homecoming since 2013, has volunteered for scholarship weekends and is a consistent donor to Coe's Annual Fund.

Nylin's care and commitment to his patients and his profession earned him the honor of being named one of the 100 Great Iowa Nurses of 2019. According to the 100 Great Iowa Nurses program, the award "recognizes nurses that have made meaningful, lasting contributions to their patients, colleagues and the nursing profession and are viewed as mentors to other nursing professionals."

Nylin resides in Clinton with his wife, Megan, who is an elementary school teacher in the community school district.

ALUMNI AWARD OF MERIT

Every college has professors who are beloved and remembered by their students long after they graduate. At the University of Wisconsin-Eau Claire College of Business, Paula Ginder Lentz is one of those professors.

At Coe, Lentz was a member of Mu Phi Epsilon and graduated Phi Beta Kappa in 1989 with her degree in English and psychology and a minor in music. She went on to earn her Master of Arts in English from UW-Eau Claire in 1998 and her doctorate in rhetoric and scientific and technical communication from the University of Minnesota.

Lentz joined the business communication faculty in the College of Business at UW-Eau Claire in 1999 and has been teaching there ever since. She also is the academic program director for the Department of Business Communication, the academic director for the UW MBA Consortium, the director of the Student Professional Development Program and the director of the Business Writing and Presentations Studio.

In her years as a faculty member, Lentz has developed and taught numerous courses in both the undergraduate and MBA programs including Business Writing; Advanced Business Writing; Communicating for Success: Speak, Engage, Lead; and Leading a Dynamic and Diverse Workforce. She has served on a variety of committees within the College of Business and UW-Eau Claire as a whole. She is a member of the Association for Business Communication's (ABC) executive board and has served on and chaired several committees and task forces within the organization to support the profession of business communication. She also has dozens of publications and research presentations to her credit, including several business communication textbooks. She is the co-author of "Rhetorical Theory and Praxis in the Business Communication Classroom," which won ABC's Distinguished Book on Business Communication award in 2019.

Throughout her career, Lentz has been honored with several awards and accolades. In 2017, she received the Francis Weeks Award of Merit from ABC, which recognizes contributions to the profession and outstanding accomplishments that advanced the discipline of business communication. In 2020, she received the Meada Gibbs Outstanding Teacher-Scholar Award, ABC's top national award for teaching. In 2020, the students in the MBA program voted her the Outstanding Instructor in the program's module courses. In 2021, she won the UWEC College of Business Coaching award.

If you talk to Lentz's students, it is easy to see why she earns such accolades. In a news article published by UW-Eau Claire announcing Lentz's selection for the Meada Gibbs award, one of her students was quoted as saying, "I could not think of a professor more deserving of this award. ... Dr. Lentz's advanced BCOM class was the most rigorous I've taken and taught me the most of any course in all of my four years at UWEC." Another student noted, "My favorite thing about Dr. Lentz is how much she genuinely cares about her students and wants us to succeed."

In addition to Lentz's teaching career, she is active in the music program at her church, where she plays the organ and participates in choirs and instrumental ensembles. She is a past member of the Eau Claire Chamber Orchestra Board of Directors, serving as president from 2014-2017. Coe has remained important to Lentz as well — she has returned to campus for various events including Homecoming, and she has been a loyal Annual Fund donor for many years.

Lentz's work has made positive impacts and advancements within the College of Business at UW-Eau Claire and the broader profession of business communication. But perhaps most importantly, she has had a positive and lasting impact on her

students. By challenging them academically while also showing true care and concern for them as individuals, she has helped countless students succeed.

DISTINGUISHED SERVICE AWARD

Loyal Kohawks can be found all over the country, and you'll find one of them in Madison, Wisconsin. Heather Daniels may have left the nest when she graduated, but she never lost her connection with Coe — if anything, it has grown stronger.

Daniels was active on campus as a Coe student. She was a founding member of the pompon squad, played in concert band and jazz band and was a member of Coe Greens, Alpha Lambda Delta, Strata, Phi Beta Kappa and Mortar Board. She graduated in 1995 with her degree in biology and went on to earn her master's degree in biology from Boston University in 1996 and her Master of Library Science from the University of Wisconsin-Madison in 2003.

Daniels has worked for UW-Madison for the past 25 years in various roles. She began as the assistant director of graduate studies in the Neuroscience Training Program and then took on the role of research administrator in the Graduate School. In 2013, she became secretary of the academic staff until she was named secretary of the faculty in early 2020. In her role, she facilitates shared governance for over 2,000 faculty on the UW-Madison campus and acts as the main liaison between the faculty and the administration.

At UW-Madison, Daniels is known and appreciated for her administrative talents. In 2007, she received the Chancellor's Award for Excellence in Service to the University in recognition of her work in not only managing the Neuroscience Training Program a job that required her to coordinate more than 50 graduate students and 80 faculty members from six schools and colleges and 22 departments — but also her efforts to encourage women in science and address issues of equity and diversity across campus.

Although Daniels has spent her career at another institution of higher education, her dedication to Coe has never wavered. She has long been Coe's "boots on the ground" in Wisconsin, hosting or assisting with 13 alumni events in Milwaukee since 2006. She also makes it a point to travel back to Coe for Homecoming/June Reunion and has made it to those events nearly every year since 2006. Her love of Coe also led her to serve on the Coe College Alumni Council from 2004-2016, including being president from 2012-2014.

Along with her time and talents, Daniels has provided Coe with financial gifts as well. She and her husband, Alan Hiebert '96, have been longtime supporters of the college. Among many projects, they have supported the renovations of Hickok Hall and Peterson Hall of Science. They are loyal supporters of the Coe Fund and belong to the Heritage Club, Coe's planned giving society.

Daniels' service to Coe has far-reaching effects that benefit everyone in the Kohawk community. By volunteering her time and sharing her passion for Coe, she has helped other alumni connect and build relationships with the college, contributing to the robust alumni network for which Coe is known. Her generosity makes incredible opportunities possible for students and inspires others to give back as well. Coe College is stronger because of Daniels, and she is most deserving of the Distinguished Service Award.

A new indoor 200-meter track was made possible by a generous gift from Coe Trustee Dave Lusson '87. Coe is one of the only Division III colleges in America with a Mondo Super X 720 surface oversized indoor track and a 90 meter sprint straightaway. The same surface was used in the 2021 Summer Tokyo Olympics.

2 No match for a derecho

Major repairs were made to the outdoor tennis courts, Sinclair Auditorium stained glass windows and roofs that were damaged in the derecho last year. Kohawks also banded together to replant over 200 trees that were lost in the storm. Over 120 trees and funds were generously donated by the Coe community.

A NEW SCOREBOARD TO COMMEMORATE PAPA STAKE

A new state-of-the-art digital scoreboard dedicated to the memory of Coach Steve Staker was installed at Clark Field Stadium with a generous \$50,000 lead gift from the Staker family. For the first time in Coe's 170-year history, a graduated class was invited back for Commencement after the pandemic postponed plans for the Class of 2020. PRIORITIZING MENTAL AND EMOTIONAL WELL-BEING

The Office of Health and Wellness continues to expand wellness events including free virtual yoga, meditation and mindfulness classes for students, faculty and staff.

REQUIRED TEXTBOOKS MAKE UP LIBRARY RESERVE PROJECT

SOARING HIGH IN RANKINGS

Coe is in the top 14% of four-year colleges and universities nationwide, according to The Princeton Review. Coe also ranked 10th nationally on its list of Best Schools for Internships and 20th nationally for Best Alumni Network, both in the private college category. Washington Monthly moved Coe up 39 spots in its rankings (to No. 88), naming Coe a Top 100 Liberal Arts College based on contribution to the public good.

SOLAR POWER AT WILDERNESS FIELD STATION

The Coe Wilderness Field Station is powered by solar energy thanks to a generous gift made by Roger and Consie Powell.

KOHAWKS CLAIM SUCCESS

DESPITE "COVID" SEASON

2020-2021 was an unusual year for college athletics, but Kohawk student-athletes didn't let the many challenges of the pandemic stop them from winning big. All teams were able to compete, with several achieving remarkable success despite the obstacles in their way.

WRESTLING

The wrestling team finished their 2021 season with a 7-1 overall record, nine All-Americans and three national champions for the first time in program history. Alex Friddle '23, Brock Henderson '22 and Josh Gerke '21 topped the podium in their respective weight classes at the National Wrestling Coaches Association Division III National Championships, the most individual national champions of any team in the field. Henderson also was named American Rivers Conference co-MVP and joined eight other Kohawks earning all-conference honors. To round it all out, Head Coach John Oostendorp was named Coach of the Year for the third time in his career.

SOFTBALL

The softball team had a successful spring, finishing their season as A-R-C champions and competing in the NCAA tournament for the fourth year in a row. Ellie Thurow '23 was named A-R-C Pitcher of the Year and was one of eight players named to all-conference teams. Skyler Stookey '23 was named first-team all-region by the National Fastpitch Coaches Association.

VOLLEYBALL

The volleyball team scored big this season, taking the A-R-C championship title with a 7-1 regular season record. Four players earned all-conference honors with setter and 2019-2020 Bremner Outstanding Athlete Award finalist Elli Teeple '22 being named the A-R-C Volleyball MVP, and two players received honorable mention. Head Coach DeAnn Akins and Assistant Coach Joe Adams were named Coaching Staff of the Year.

BASEBALL

It was another banner year for the Kohawk baseball team as they rounded out their season with a 36-7 overall record (28-4 in A-R-C play), won every series in league play and won the regular season conference championship. Seven players earned all-conference honors, four were named all-region and TJ Deardorff '21 and TJ Johnson '21 were named All-Americans, marking the first time in Kohawk baseball history in which two players earned the recognition in the same season. Deardorff also was named the A-R-C Pitcher of the Year, making this the second straight season a Kohawk pitcher has won the award.

MEN'S TENNIS

The men's tennis team had a strong showing this year with a 14-5 overall record (7-1 in A-R-C play). After a valiant effort, the team fell to Luther 5-2 in the conference championship match. Five players earned all-conference honors including Rami Hemaidan '22, who also was named the league MVP.

MEN'S BOWLING

The men's bowling team competed in five total events in their inaugural season and qualified for the opening round of the 2021 Intercollegiate Team Championships Sectionals, making them the only first-year program in the country to earn a spot in postseason competition.

Due to the shortened competitive seasons last year, the Barron Bremner Outstanding Athlete Award will not be awarded for 2020-2021. We look forward to presenting the 2021-2022 award next fall.



For many years, he served on the advisory board of the Chinese American Service League.


In his spare time, Veach enjoys golf, platform tennis, playing with his dog, reading, listening to music and watching movies.






ENDOWMENT - TOTAL ASSETS MARKET VALUE

FISCAL YEARS ENDING JUNE 30





DERECHO

On August 10, 2020, a catastrophic storm known as a derecho devastated Cedar Rapids and Coe College. Hurricane-force winds estimated at up to 140 mph pummeled the city for 25 minutes, causing significant damage to Coe's campus just as students were returning for the fall term. Our dedicated and quick-thinking staff members ensured students were safe and cared for during and after the storm, a situation made even more challenging due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Across campus, more than 200 trees were uprooted or destroyed, and 28 buildings were damaged, with property losses and cleanup costs totaling approximately \$2.25 million. In the months following the storm, more than 550 donors contributed to Coe's Storm Relief Fund, while a few others made gifts of new trees. This generous support allowed Coe to plant more than 140 trees, restore landscaping and repair damaged buildings and outdoor structures all across campus.

What's next... Repairs still are being made on campus during the 2021-2022 school year as Coe continues to recover from the storm. Visit campus soon to see our derecho kiosk that highlights our generous donors and features a map of all newly planted trees.

In the 2020-2021 school year, Coe awarded over \$44 million in scholarships and grants to 99.9% of our students, and we could never have done it without our Annual Fund donors. 


Hello Coe alumni!
