
Floyd Remembers:

A Spotlight on the Life and Coe Connections of an Emeritus Professor



Dr. Floyd Sandford, professor emeritus of biology, is one example of former professors embodying the Coe spirit of lifelong education, involvement and taking advantage of possibilities. "I greatly enjoyed my time at Coe, immersed in a liberal arts environment," says Floyd, who taught a wide variety of biology courses from 1971 to 2005. He has stayed busy during retirement pursuing interests ranging from traveling the world and exploring nature to serving others and even performing.

While at Coe, Floyd often led January-term off-campus study for students, including exploring Texas, visiting zoos around the country and studying seashore biology in Florida. Nature far and near remains a great passion for the biology generalist. He travels internationally, especially to the United Kingdom for long-distance hikes on their national trails. Some recent international adventures include a solo hike on the 110-mile-long Cleveland Way during September 2022 and a 10-day hike across England's Jurassic Coast in June 2021. Closer to home, Floyd manages 30 acres of land in Clayton County, planting hundreds of native trees to increase the area's biodiversity and serve as a wildlife sanctuary.



Unsurprisingly, the 2003 college-level lowa Science Teacher of the Year still dons his teaching hat often. He organizes presentations about his long-distance hikes, travels abroad and more as a frequent popular speaker at several senior living facilities. He also hasn't forgotten his beloved Coe College. While a professor, Floyd performed in several theatrical productions, sang in two operas under the late Professor Emeritus of Music Allan Kellar and debuted his one-man play, "Darwin Remembers," at Coe's community education Thursday Forum series in 2000. His play intends to "shed more light and less heat" on the life and work of English biologist Charles Darwin and has been performed across the United States. He returned to Thursday Forum this fall to perform "Darwin Remembers," making a full circle back to the world of Coe.

The Clark Merit Award provides a scholarship equal to one year's tuition for each recipient. These students have been selected by a committee of faculty members and a member of the Board of Trustees based on their integrity, intellect, leadership and social responsibility. The Clark Merit Awards are funded by an endowment created in 1995 by the late Coe alumnus K. Raymond Clark '30.

THE RETURN OF THE BARRON BREMNER OUTSTANDING ATHLETE AWARD

he full return of college athletics last school year produced some great moments for the Kohawk athletic department, but the resumption of the Barron **Bremner Outstanding Athlete** Award was the exclamation mark on the campaigns. After a yearlong break, the department's most prestigious individual awards were presented at the end of the academic year after nominations from Kohawk head coaches. The awards and the Strohm Family Endowment were generously established by John Strohm '79 and his wife Mary Pat Link in 1995. In 2001, the award was renamed after Barron Bremner in honor of his many years of outstanding service to the college, its students and community.

A committee of voters reduced the strong nominations to three male and three female finalists. Rami Hemaidan '22 (tennis), Jarad Kruse '22 (basketball) and Kaleb Reeves '23 (wrestling) were selected as male finalists. and Heather Boeckenstedt '23 (softball), Elli Teeple '22 (volleyball) and Madison Schultz '25 (tennis) were named female finalists. The six finalists combined for six all-conference, three all-region and two all-American honors while claiming two A-R-C MVP awards. All six student-athletes were invited to the annual ceremony, which was held October 16, the Sunday after Homecoming. During the event, finalists were recognized by President David Hayes '93 and Director of Athletics and Recreation Steve Cook.

At the banquet, Kaleb Reeves and Elli Teeple were announced as the 2021-22 male and female Barron Bremner Outstanding Athletes. Reeves, who was a NCAA all-American at 285 pounds, set Coe's single-season and career fall record during the 2021-22 season. Kaleb also finished the year as the fall leader across all three NCAA divisions, racking up 27 total pins. Teeple capped off an excellent career with a standout senior season, earning all-American status from the AVCA. Elli was fourth in the NCAA in total assists, ending the season with 1.213. The Barron Bremner Outstanding Female and Male Athletes each receive an inscribed medallion bearing the likeness of Barron Bremner embedded in a Lucite pyramid.

The season featured 10 competitions for the team including the SCTP State Championships and the ACUI National Meet. Freshman Erin Neppl '25 was Coe's standout performer at the State Championships in the fall, taking home the state title in the ladies collegiate sporting clay division.



RENOVATE MURRAY AND GREENE HALLS

Student life wouldn't be possible without the living arrangements that make Coe a residential campus. "High Rise" Murray Hall's nine floors make it the tallest building on Coe's campus and can house 153 students of all genders and years. The dormitory was built in 1966, with no major renovations since it was first added to campus 56 years ago. The all-male Greene Hall can be home to 247 students of all years, with several of its floors dedicated to housing fraternities. It was first built in 1938 and has not seen the attention of a large renovation since 1983.

For both Murray and Greene, it's time. We have implemented a crucial project to renovate and update both structural and furnishing elements of these buildings. CHSDEDICATION For the future of health care, for Coe, for the Mc Inallys

The newest addition to Coe's campus already is attracting a crowd.

After construction crews cleared out, the curious came in for the dedication of the David and Janice McInally Center for Health & Society (CHS). A large contingent of individuals and organizations from across campus and up-and-down the Corridor were on hand the evening of Thursday, September 29 to celebrate the project's visionary roots and recognize the namesakes of the shimmering new three-story space.

As the guests of honor, Coe President Emeritus David McInally and former First Lady Janice McInally were central to the event, but all attendees were instrumental in the vision, funding, completion or future of the CHS. They explored the upper levels, marveling at the floor-to-ceiling windows in the classrooms while envisioning the advanced equipment that would be in place, before gathering for remarks in the Esther and Robert Armstrong Charitable Trust Lobby of the CHS.

"It is a great honor to dedicate the Center for Health & Society to David and Janice McInally, and I am delighted they are here to join us," said Coe President David Hayes '93.

Invitees included National Advisory Board members Michelle Niermann (President and CEO for UnityPoint Health - Cedar Rapids), Okpara Rice (CEO of Tanager Place), Tim Charles (Mercy Medical Center President and CEO), Dr. Tim Sagers '97 (MercyCare Business Health Solutions) and Dr. **Dustin Arnold '91** (UnityPoint Health - St. Luke's Chief Medical Officer and Associate Medical Director of Hospital-Based Providers). Other Board members are health experts from across the country, including eight more Coe graduates. Dr. Mary Jeanne Krob '73 is the chair.

Additionally, organizations critical to construction were represented including the Hall Perrine Foundation, the Esther and Robert Armstrong Charitable Trust, Family

Caregivers Center of Mercy, MedQuarter Regional Medical District, the City of Cedar Rapids, OPN Architects and Build to Suit Inc.

This particular moment belonged to the McInallys, though, who described the occasion as "almost surreal."

"Coming up with the project, visualizing it and now actually seeing it, it's almost like I can see students coming in and working with our faculty and using the rooms. It's really great," David McInally said.

"It's really an honor. We wanted to do something to give back to the wonderful students and faculty at Coe. To see [the CHS] and see our names on it is incredible, knowing how it will affect campus life, the future of Coe and its students. It's truly a humbling experience and we are so grateful," Janice McInally added.

Hayes began his remarks with a story. As he was showing David McInally around campus after McInally first started at Coe, the president emeritus asked how many medical providers were within walking distance of campus. Hayes thought that was the first spark of the idea to create the CHS.

"The vision was his from the very beginning," Hayes noted. "It was a prescient one, too, because at that time he did not know the public health crisis that was far on the horizon."

As impressive as it is, the physical space is just the conduit, though, for Kohawks to explore transformative opportunities, as other speakers noted.

"This building supports the notion that Coe students and graduates have a connection to something larger than themselves. We want our students to understand that health careers are expansive," Vice Chair of the Coe Board of Trustees, Sigrid Reynolds '94 said.











With the CHS, any major at Coe College could lead to a career related to health and well-being. Advising, networking and firsthand experience will facilitate the pursuit of a range of career paths that suit a student's individual strengths. For instance, art majors could learn about medical illustration, religion majors could study the role of spirituality in healing and business majors could prepare to become administrators. The CHS will help people realize they can have a career helping people, directly and indirectly, and alleviate some of the staffing burden the health industry is facing — which is expected to have 2.6 million open positions by 2030.

Joining Hayes and Reynolds as speakers were current student Antonia Valdivia Araya '24 and Interim Provost Angela Ziskowski.

"The new Center for Health & Society will allow Coe College to focus on pre-health paths, allied health and the medical humanities through a multi and interdisciplinary lens," Ziskowski said.

"Aarman Rowther very articulately shared that for premedical students the liberal arts teach the basis for language and communication between doctor and patient, they teach the critical thinking required for the uncertain and ethically challenging decisions faced by all in the medical profession, and the large questions that face the health fields about what roles they should play in healthcare politics, business and society as a whole," Ziskowski added.

With the addition of the CHS, Coe is now positioned as the preferred liberal arts choice for pre-health students. The Center will help expand health-related graduate outcomes with experienced advisors, dual degree opportunities and direct connections to internships or job shadowing within the Cedar Rapids MedQuarter Regional Medical District.

President Emeritus McInally fittingly summed up the endeavor best.

"I loved the feeling I got from Coe as soon as I got on campus the first time. It's incredible the way that everyone can access these resources. Especially now as we are living through a pandemic, it's such important knowledge for everyone to have, regardless of their major or discipline. And [the CHS] helps provide that; people have the knowledge to help themselves and those around them through this time," he said.



As Chair of the Center for Health & Society Board of Advisors, Dr. Mary Jeanne Krob '73 helped form the vision and is now helping to guide the implementation of the CHS. With an extensive direct care background, she is excited by the prospect of expansive health education and prepared to help all those who are interested in helping others.

After Coe, she received a master's degree in genetics at the University of Missouri in 1974, her M.D. at the University of Iowa in 1978 and a master's degree in instructional design and technology at the University of Iowa in 1995. As a physician and surgeon, Mary Jeanne retired as a medical director at Highmark Blue Cross and Blue Shield in 2021 and served as Medical Director of the Burn Center at Mercy Hospital in Pittsburgh from 1987-1991.

"Health care is more than being a doctor, nurse or therapist. How can we work to help immerse our students in non-traditional and creative ways to help support health? The answer to that question is the CHS," she said.



Coe welcomes students from across the country and around the globe in the Class of 2026

The internships, networking and community at Coe College and in Cedar Rapids continue to attract a diverse and motivated group of students. The possibilities are appealing for those who seek not only a rigorous academic experience, but opportunities outside the classroom that will enhance their education and provide a professional head start. The Coe College class of 2026 is the latest to see this great promise.

Traveling from as far as 7,500 miles away, and as near as two miles, Coe welcomed nearly 400 new students and a geographically diverse class — both domestically and internationally. New students joining the Coe community represent 270 cities, 26 states and seven countries with 60 percent of the Class of 2026 enrolling from outside of Iowa. Also, 35 percent of the group comes from underrepresented backgrounds, which is the highest percentage for a single class in the college's history.

"When you look at Coe's combination of distinctive features, some of which were recently recognized by The Princeton Review such as the most accessible faculty, there simply is not another college like Coe in Iowa and only a small number in the country," said Coe's Vice President for Enrollment, Marketing and Institutional Effectiveness Julie Kleis Staker '93.

Kohawks will capitalize on the college's focus on personal academic preparation and excellence in providing robust professional and extracurricular experiences, such as

internships, networking and athletics. The Princeton Review ranked Coe No. 17 nationally for Best Career Services and No. 20 nationally for Most Accessible Professors, as well as the No. 10 Best School for Internships and No. 20 Best Alumni Network among private schools. Coe is lowa's only college or university to be ranked for career services, accessible professors and alumni network.

More than half of the incoming class are student-athletes, and the academic profile features an average GPA of 3.6 and an average ACT of 25. More than half of the students ranked in the top 30 percent of their graduating class.

Nearly 100 percent of reporting graduates find employment, attend graduate school or engage in a service opportunity within nine months of graduation, and have done so consistently now for more than a decade.

"I'm really excited for this class," said Associate Vice President for Enrollment and Dean of Admission Josh Kite. "The opportunities students will have to work closely with Coe's excellent faculty and staff to challenge themselves academically and gain professional experience will leave them well prepared for their futures."



THE INAUGURATION OF



David Hayes '93 gently tamped down loose soil surrounding a recently planted tree the morning of his inauguration. It was an act which provided just a little protection for the sapling and its roots, but was heavy with symbolism.

A native of Cedar Rapids, former Coe student body president, two-time C.J. Lynch Outstanding Teacher awardee and vice president for advancement, Hayes was already a Kohawk through and through. However on Friday, October 28, 2022, dressed head to toe in crimson and gold including his favorite socks, Hayes' Coe roots grew even deeper as he was inaugurated as the 16th president of Coe College — the first alumnus to hold the title.

And, like stabilizing the tree, the rest of the day was about strengthening the prospects of the college.

In his inaugural address, Hayes demonstrated the depth of his relationship with Coe while simultaneously weaving in stories of his past and delivering his vision for the college's future. He One of the more poignant moments was Hayes' experience after his sophomore year. He lost his father the day he came home from that academic year. Half a dozen Coe faculty came to the visitation, but it was an encounter shortly after the devastating loss that left a lasting impression.

"A month or so later on campus, I bumped into the then academic dean, who happened to be the eventual 14th president of Coe, Dr. James Phifer. I will never forget this. He had no reason to know me, but he stopped me — a 20-year-old rising junior — to ask if I was OK and if I needed anything from the college. And he then counseled me that I would think of my father every day for the rest of my life, that was just fine, and to embrace it and understand that these are the thoughts and memories of how we bridge experiences and go forward," Hayes recalled.

The empathy and personal nature of that moment has carried into how Hayes interacts with students, staff, faculty and other colleagues. Constituency pledges were delivered by Coe Student Body President Toby Lister '24, Coe Alumni Association President Lauren DuBay Gilbertson '13,

began, though, by acknowledging all those who have invested in him and noting the day was truly about celebrating the college as a whole.

"This gratitude that swells my soul is shaped and scoped by the fact I as a Kohawk find myself on the stage of Sinclair Auditorium, accepting the presidency of Coe College," Hayes said.

What's remarkable is that Hayes' first appearance on the Sinclair stage — behind the same podium — was just over 30 years prior, as the student body president during orientation for the Class of 1997.

Hayes asked the crowd filling Sinclair if they would allow him to reminisce a bit, and recounted stories of his time as a student and encounters he has had throughout his roles at the college. Ben Peterson Professor of Chemistry and Environmental Studies Marty St. Clair, Associate Vice President for Advancement Barb Ernst Tupper '89, Cedar Rapids City Councilman Dale Todd '78, Cedar Rapids First Presbyterian Church elder Rev. Herbert Isenberg and Coe College Board of Trustees member retired Brigadier General Hank Taylor '75. Delegates from 13 other colleges, universities and higher education organizations were in attendance, as well, while eight other institutions of higher learning sent certificates honoring Hayes on the occasion.

Presenting Hayes for the presidency was Greater Des Moines Partnership CEO, and longtime friend from their time together in law school, Jay Byers.

Describing Hayes as a "renaissance person" (which includes keeping a steady beat as the drummer in their law school band), Byers added, "I have long thought David would make an















excellent college president, and I firmly believe he is the right person at the right time to serve as Coe's president."

Now, Hayes' dream is to build on the momentum and reputation Coe holds both in the measurable categories like academic rigor and professional outcomes as well as the intangible. He is at the helm of a college that offers a first rate liberal arts education and is nationally ranked for internships, career services, accessible professors and alumni network. But, Hayes noted that's not the most important Coe story.

"I can tell you [Coe] is so much more than classrooms, laboratories, fields and stages. I have heard [stories like] my Coe story told again and again, by scores of alumni, who can put a finger directly on how Coe literally changed their lives, gave them traction when it would be so easy to slip, and launched them forward toward lives of accomplishment," Hayes said. "This enterprise, this thing we call Coe College — is precious and unique."

"I know exactly the value of Coe, and it will endure," Hayes said.

"At a time when so many seek an environment where they feel valued and a sense of belonging, we need to work with intention to assure that my Coe experience is never the exception, but it's instead so intensely woven into the very fabric of this place — our shared DNA — that every single student feels nurtured, welcomed and valued," Hayes added.

Moving forward, Hayes vowed to enhance the Kohawk experience at every step and stage. A central part of his vision is expanded partnerships throughout Cedar Rapids and the Creative Corridor. He sees vibrant extracurricular activities and a focus on life skills that will continue to create a clear path to personal and professional success for Kohawks.

"I thank you for receiving and considering these remarks, and for helping me celebrate today. I am so grateful and blessed to call this college home. And for the first time in its 171 year history, your president can lead the cheer, Alma mater, hail hail hail."

Nancy Skogsbergh '53 Women of Coe



Few people can claim to be as Coe-to-the-core as Nancy **Skogsbergh '53**. The connection started young. As a seventhgrader, she hung out in Hickok Hall and greeted the president by name. As years passed, she would fire the starting gun for

the Lamb-Kohawk cross country meet and used her Kohawk experience to become a top nursing educator in Eastern Iowa.

For eight decades, there has been an unbreakable bond between Nancy and Coe. The college provided a livelihood for her family growing up, a valuable education and stories that have stuck with her through all the years.

Her history with Coe, though, begins with her father — Harris Lamb **'27**, a Coe legend in his own right. Harris was a standout athlete during his days as a student, earning an induction into the Coe Athletic Hall of Fame as a charter member. He

returned to campus later as a coach, co-athletic director with his brother, Willis, and eventually was Coe's first alumni director, bringing Coe coast-tocoast. He's fondly remembered by many as never forgetting a name.

It's clear Nancy, now 91, has fond memories of her father as well because he was the instigator in her Kohawk story. Harris moved his family from Ada, Ohio, and Ohio Northern University to work at Coe when Nancy was 12. She had heard his stories and passion for Coe and quickly developed an affinity of her own as she became familiar with campus.

"I knew most everybody on campus — faculty, coaches, even the president," Nancy recalled. "I was comfortable."

With her mother ailing and her familiarity with the area, choosing where to go to college was simple — she was confident in Coe. Nancy could even walk to campus from their home.

As she started as a student, many service members were also pursuing their degrees after serving in World War II. There was a camaraderie on campus that created both a fun atmosphere and an engaging learning environment. In fact, famous Coe figures like Marv Levy '50 and Wayne "Phiz" Phillips '56 have kept up with her through the years.

"I was surrounded by good people, fun guys." We just had a wonderful time," Nancy said. "And beyond that, I was able to express myself, have an opinion, debate and be heard. Through those experiences I learned how to think on my own, care and how to help others."

She created plenty of friendships during her time attending Coe, but also encountered challenges in the classroom — namely statistics. She loved psychology because she learned how to relate to different people, but numbers were different. Fortunately, even then, tutors were available and it was her father that led her to the resources and provided the encouragement for her to buckle down and pass, even though she was working nights at the time.

Her experience with conquering statistics gave her confidence to take on other subjects she didn't have much experience with, including chemistry with Dr. Ben Peterson, who is the namesake of Peterson Hall on campus.

"He took care of us non-majors just like his [chemistry] majors. That's the attitude that Coe had. I mean, everyone just wanted us to succeed," Nancy said.

Nancy carried that helpful approach into the next phase of her life, where her Coe roots blossomed into an incredible career as an educator at Unity Point-St. Luke's hospital across from campus.

Nursing education looked different 70 years ago in Cedar Rapids — St. Luke's ran its own nursing school, and Nancy split her time between the hospital and Coe in a five-year program, eventually graduating with a Bachelor of Arts from Coe and a nursing diploma from St. Luke's. Education was where her heart was, so she combined that passion with her nursing acumen and worked at St. Luke's for 46 years, mostly as an influential nursing faculty member. She even received her Master of Arts in educational administration from the University of Iowa in 1979, while she was raising her children. She retired in 1999 as an education administrator in St Luke's Patient Care Services, where she continued to develop ongoing training materials.

There are even parallels between Nancy's career and the establishment of the David and Janice

McInally Center for Health & Society on campus. As the face of professional nursing in the area, Nancy was essential to health care growth in Cedar Rapids. Former students remember her as always smart, confident, enthusiastic, kind, respectful, articulate and compassionate. The similarities come to a head with one trait in particular — possessing a prescient vision for health care needs and evolution.

In particular, Nancy reinforced a culture of caring at St. Luke's, renowned for her devotion to patient advocacy. She even came full circle back to Coe as an adjunct nursing instructor in the '80s.

Nancy was recognized with the St. Luke's Foundation Founder's Award in June 2022 for her service to the school of nursing, which closed in 1987 after graduating 2,524 students since 1892, and her continuing educational service within the hospital afterward. The Founder's Award honors "community members who have had a significant and outstanding impact on health care in Eastern lowa through their leadership and devotion," which is certainly one way to describe Nancy.

In retrospect, she has lived a life of service, for which Coe and her family prepared her.

As alumnus Jonathan Dyrland '01 attests, "getting to go out on 'the road' with my college friends and experience so much of the United States while also making music are some of the biggest highlights of my college years."

To support these irreplaceable experiences provided by Coe's band tours, Joe Lilly '99 and his wife Kim have established the William S. Carson Band Tour Endowment Fund. For the guitar fan from Chicago who had not planned on attending college, meeting Alma A. Turechek Professor of Music and Director of Bands Bill Carson made all the difference. Joe knew he had to go to Coe after a tour of campus and a couple conversations with Dr. Carson, a professor he recalls as being clearly in love with his job and sincerely interested in his students.

"Giving back to Coe by creating or participating in an endowment is something I've wanted to do for a long time," Joe said. "After conversations with my wife, we decided that a fund designed to advance Dr. Carson's tour work is the best way for us to not only support Coe, but also to say thank you to Dr. Carson for everything he has done to benefit so many Coe music alumni."





Some highlights include the wrestling team's six NCAA National Qualifiers and two All-Americans; women's track & field team's two all-conference performers, their first since 2018; the baseball team winning the American Rivers Conference Tournament; and two student-athletes being named the A-R-C men's and women's tennis MVPs.

The Blanchard-Pettibone Textbook Project implemented an initiative for required textbooks to be available on reserve at the library. Recent alumni gifted 70 textbooks toward this project and helped provide access to resources for all students.

The Office of Student Success & Persistence (OSSP) was created in fall 2021 and had its first year in existence during the 2021-2022 fiscal year. The OSSP was created to help first-year students with the transition from high school to college.

During the 2022 Day of Giving, we raised \$745,232 which greatly surpassed our original \$500,000 goal! Alumni accounted for 75% of those donations, with the remaining quarter coming from faculty, staff, parents, students and friends. Gifts have allowed us to improve physical aspects of Coe's campus both small — such as replacing the crumbling steps to Stewart Memorial Library — and large — such as completing the majority of CHS construction.

explores the current condition of the United States as it has struggled through a pandemic, financial unrest and increasingly unhappy citizens.







"The judiciary has lost a legend. Chief Justice Moon was a visionary leader and trailblazer in the legal profession. But he never forgot his roots growing up in Wahiawa, and wanted every person to be treated fairly and with respect when they came into our courtrooms," said Chief Justice Mark Recktenwald, in a statement. "Under his leadership, the Supreme Court decided landmark cases ranging from same sex marriage, to protecting native Hawaiian rights and the environment. He also worked tirelessly to make the judiciary more effective and accessible, and shaped us into the institution we are today."

Born on September 4, 1940, in Wahiawa, Hawaii, Moon came of age during Wahiawa's plantation era and graduated from the Mid-Pacific Institute. After his graduation, Moon attended Coe College in Cedar Rapids, Iowa, before earning his law degree from The University of Iowa. He started out in public service when former Hawaii Gov. George Ariyoshi appointed him to serve as a circuit judge.

In 1990, Gov. John Waihee elevated Moon to associate justice on the Supreme Court. Moon, who spent 45 years working the law (28 years of which spent on the bench), declined a lifetime appointment to the federal court because it meant returning to the trial court level. Three years later, Waihee appointed Moon chief justice, making him the first and only chief justice of Korean ancestry in the country at the time.
